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POOL & HOT TUB:

There have been many heater issues the past few months with both the indoor pool and hot tub heaters. The hot tub heater was replaced several months ago, but recently the igniter failed and was replaced. The indoor pool heater has been having major problems with the thermostat causing hot and cold temperature fluctuations. We are happy to announce that the indoor pool heater was replaced two weeks ago.

Beginning July 1st, we will be using a new landscaping company. The previous vendor was retained on a trial month to month basis. After reviewing performance and owner satisfaction, the Board made the decision to terminate the service. The new company looks very promising and will be closely monitored to ensure they are delivering the expected standard.

VALLEY VIEW XERISCAPE PROJECT:

The project is scheduled to be completed in September. We will likely have a work project as part of our annual meeting in the Fall. The park strips along Valley View and the most Northern section remain to be completed. A HUGE Thank you to all that have volunteered their time and talents in prepping the areas, running the drip line irrigation, planting the plans, and moving gravel.

BACKYARD PROJECTS AND DOOR/WINDOW CHANGES:

Many owners have been making changes to their backyards and updating doors and windows. We encourage owners to be engaged in projects to enhance the appearance of their unit as allowed by the CCR's. **REMEMBER**, any changes need to be submitted to the Board for review and approval. CIGARETTE BUTTS:

Just make sure all your garbage is inside the trash bins. The company contracted to haul away our garbage only takes the garbage inside the bins.

We should take pride in where we live. Please understand what the landscapers responsibilities are. They mow, edge, blow, and trim.

They are not responsible for flower gardens, speciality plants, or weeds in front of your house or in your Lawn. **In the past**, there was a culture at Willow Run that no one was supposed to do anything outside of their home. This board would like to **change that culture** and have everyone take personal responsibility for the upkeep of the exterior of their homes. If you want to make major changes, there is a <u>Architecture Request Form</u> requiring Board approval.

Minor improvements in the appearance of every dwelling in Willow Run enhances not only the value of your home, but the value of every other dwelling at Willow Run. It makes Willow Run a nicer neighborhood to live in. Let's take more pride in and around our homes.
